

May 18th 1863 Kato Place
Hon John Stone

Dear Uncle

I arrived here three days ago
and have been in bed ever since. not able
to get about and purchase corn and other
articles necessary for subsistence. I reached
here without money but got \$3000 from Willis
day before yesterday but if we should have
to move any farther, I will need more
for corn and everything has gone up since
we have got in the country, I am doing
better this morning. I have pretty comfortable
quarters here, have had several very sick
slaves but all getting better at present
Ours to be remembered.

to Mrs. Anderson & Austin nephew

I would like very much to see you before
you left again. Thus you might instruct
me what to do with these negroes. B. Prescott
speaks of going on to Texas where he can
hire out his negroes in harvesting the cotton
speaks of not going any farther. So if B
