

1864 Longstreet wrote our. Ga June 6<sup>th</sup> 1864

To W. G. Weeks } Dear William  
Houston Texas } Since I last wrote to you  
I have had very little time to spare and  
have been looking over the amounts of  
W. G. Weeks etc, and send you herewith a  
Statement and balance Sheet, I have been  
and am still anxious that every thing that  
has passed through my hands should be  
made plain to prevent any difficulties  
here after, Since the Statement sent you I  
have looked over the amount of sales of lots  
in Weeks' Extension of New Haven and find  
that all the sales were carried to the credit of  
Mr. M. L. Moore - May 22<sup>nd</sup> 1862. I made  
up a statement & found that the amount  
of the principal on the price of lots received to  
that date was \$9031.<sup>25</sup>  $\frac{1}{2}$  is \$952.<sup>66</sup> Weeks'  
first vehicle I have carried to the credit of  
W. G. Weeks & debit of Mr. M. L. Moore that date  
to April 2<sup>nd</sup> 1863. The amount principal received may  
be \$3806.<sup>25</sup>  $\frac{1}{2}$  is \$317.<sup>18</sup> which I have carried to the  
credit of the debit of Mr. M. L. Moore. Since  
not including any interest or balance I  
carried the Taxes & Expenses paid by  
~~to~~ to be included above or over balance the  
interest - and it would now be impossible  
to make out a correct amount of Taxes & Expenses  
paid and I feel certain that the difference  
would be small in amount here in favor  
of Mr. L. Moore -

My health has been pretty good lately  
yesterday I had to take medicine

I hope to visit Shreveport as soon  
as I can to talk with the officers for the  
true class of Slaves working on the Public  
Works, some of the officers I found very  
intelligent and courteous gentlemen. others  
were uneducated and ~~were~~<sup>in</sup> no hurry  
spare no attention to private claims -  
I lost two valuable men at Shreveport  
one died in the hospital, and the surgeon  
paid so little attention to the case that he  
neglected to enter his name where the body  
of death, and I had great trouble in getting  
a certificate of his death, and but for the  
politeness & attention of a Capt. removable  
of the Engineers' corps I never would have  
been able to get one -

I have been disappointed in not  
receiving any letters from you since your  
return to Texas - I got a letter from Maggie  
this morning no word the States that  
Lt. W has gone to Texas to see what she  
and that her daughter Done who was  
badly lame is recovering very slowly.

Remember me kindly to Mr. Webb  
all friends & associates best wishes for  
yourself from yours John H. Gray

after writing the above I got your letter  
directed to Mansfield stating that you  
would buy me a visit I therefore  
resumed & send you this
