

Sturville Oct 31st 1863.

My Dear Sir.

I think so strange
that I do not hear from you
I have written to you, two
or three times recently, the last
letter I received from you was
dated Sept 29th. Mr. Weightman
has also written to you, but
has not heard from you.
I felt very uneasy about you,
feared that you were sick, but
I heard of you in Spreenport
last week, which relieved my
mind, I feared that you were
sick. then I thought perhaps the
mails had stopped, as I get no
letters from Maggie or any
of aunt Libs family. I have
had from none of them
for more than a month.

I hope to be back's family here
not yet from Worcester: no
there is no chance of their
getting here now. and they
could not be comfortable in
Worcester, besides being very
expensive being that your
bill I expect to be surprising
to them, that can have not
yet left for Worcester, I have
not heard or heard from
my family since the 4th.
I suppose the time necessary has
taken the money or have
fallen to, and am putting
up some orders, and trying
to make things comfortable
for us. we are looking for
them again but have not
idea when they will come
for us. perhaps not for
two weeks. I think it strange
one of them do not write.

I send another account but
no one here - the girls I cannot
like to do - or to give the rest
another day, regularly in.
we have had some very
cold weather already, in
document time, but may be
soon. It is well you did not
start before I put so anxious
about your and all the family
that are in the country time.
I fear they will have nothing
left to eat. Please order you
write let me know of
your hair and anything
from them. The mail
is about closing. and I must
end my letter. Also write to
me no more as your sister
Mr. Bond to Sturwell. The
